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PREPOSITIONS

A preposition connects a noun or pronoun to another word in a sentence. It indicates a relationship of place, time, direction, cause, purpose, means etc. It has special functions as part of a verb or an adverb. Like adverbs, it is difficult to recognize prepositions just from the form of the words. In fact, some words can function both as prepositions and as adverbs or even conjunctions.

Prepositions are words (such as *in* and *out*, *above* and *below*, *to* and *from*) that show the relationship between other words and phrases in a sentence. Prepositions often show location ("*under* the table"), direction ("*to* the south"), or time ("*past* midnight").Prepositions are the words that indicate location. Usually, prepositions show this location in the physical world. Check out the three examples below:







The puppy is on the floor. The puppy is in the trash can. The puppy is beside the phone.

On, in, and beside are all prepositions. They are showing *where* the puppy is. Prepositions can also show location in *time*. Read the next three examples:

At midnight, Jill craved mashed potatoes with grape jelly.

In the spring, I always vow to plant tomatoes but end up buying them at the supermarket.

During the marathon, Iggy's legs complained with sharp pains shooting up his thighs.

At midnight, in the spring, and during the marathon all show location in time.

Because there are so many possible locations, there are quite a few prepositions. Below is the complete list.

Prepositions of Time: at, on, and in

We use *a* to designate specific times.

The train is due at 12:15 p.m.

We use on to designate days and dates.

My brother is coming on Monday.

We're having a party on the Fourth of July.

We use *in* for nonspecific times during a day, a month, a season, or a year.

She likes to jog in the morning.



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It's too cold in winter to run outside.

He started the job in 1971.

He's going to quit in August.

Prepositions of Place: at, on, and in

We use at for specific addresses. Grammar English lives at 55 Boretz Road in Durham.

We use on to designate names of streets, avenues, etc. Her house is on Boretz Road.

And we use *in* for the names of land-areas (towns, counties, states, countries, and continents).

She lives in Durham.

Durham is in Windham County. Windham County is in Connecticut

Prepositions with Nouns, Adjectives, and Verbs.

Prepositions are sometimes so firmly wedded to other words that they have practically become one word. (In fact, in other languages, such as German, they would have become one word.) This occurs in three categories: nouns, adjectives, and verbs.

Prepositions of Movement: to and No Preposition

We use to in order to express movement toward a place.

They were driving to work together.

She's going to the dentist's office this morning.

Toward and *towards* are also helpful prepositions to express movement. These are simply variant spellings of the same word; use whichever sounds better to you.

We're moving toward the light.

This is a big step towards the project's completion.

With the words home, downtown, uptown, inside, outside, downstairs, upstairs, we use no preposition.

Grandma went upstairs



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Grandpa went home.

They both went outside.

Prepositions of Time: for and since

We use *for* when we measure time (seconds, minutes, hours, days, months, years). He held his breath for seven minutes.

She's lived there for seven years.

The British and Irish have been quarreling for seven centuries.

We use *since* with a specific date or time.

He's worked here since 1970.

She's been sitting in the waiting room since two-thirty.

A combination of verb and preposition is called a **phrasal verb**. The word that is joined to the verb is then called a **particle**. Please refer to the brief section we have prepared on <u>phrasal verbs</u> for an explanation.

Idiomatic Expressions with Prepositions

- agree to a proposal, with a person, on a price, in principle
- argue about a matter, with a person, for or against a proposition
- compare to to show likenesses, with to show differences (sometimes similarities)
- correspond to a thing, with a person
- differ from an unlike thing, with a person
- live at an address, in a house or city, on a street, with other people

Bloopers / Unnecessary Prepositions

In everyday speech, we fall into some bad habits, using prepositions where they are not necessary. It would be a good idea to eliminate these words altogether, but we must be especially careful not to use them in formal, academic prose.

- She met up with the new coach in the hallway.
- The book fell off of the desk.
- He threw the book out of the window.
- She wouldn't let the cat inside of the house. [or use "in"]
- Where did they go to?
- Put the lamp in back of the couch. [use "behind" instead]
- Where is your college at?


