Working Rule For Diagonalisation:

* To find the characteristic equation.

* To notive the characteristic equation.

* To find the Eigen values

* To find the Eigen vectors

* To find the Eigen vectors

* If the Eigen vectors are orthogonal, then form a normalized model N.

* Normalized forms is
$$N = \begin{bmatrix} 24/L \\ 22/L \\ 23/L \end{bmatrix}$$
 where $l = \sqrt{x_1^2 + x_2^2 + x_3^2}$

* Find N^T

* Calculate AN

* Calculate $D = N^TAN$

Problems:

1. Diagonalise the maturi
$$\begin{bmatrix} 8 & -6 & 2 \\ -6 & 7 & -4 \\ +2 & -4 & 3 \end{bmatrix}$$
Let $A = \begin{bmatrix} 8 & -6 & 2 \\ -6 & 7 & -4 \\ 2 & -4 & 3 \end{bmatrix}$
Characteristic equation $\Rightarrow \lambda^8 - 18\lambda^2 + 45\lambda = 0$

Figure values are 0,3,15

Figure vectors i) If $\lambda = 0$, then Figure vector is $\begin{bmatrix} 1 & 2 & 2 \end{bmatrix}^T$

ii) If $\lambda = 3$, then Figure vector is $\begin{bmatrix} 2 & 1 & -2 \end{bmatrix}^T$

ii) If $\lambda = 15$, then Figure vector is $\begin{bmatrix} 2 & -2 & 1 \end{bmatrix}^T$



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To find the Figer vectors are orthogonal to each other.
$$X_1^T X_2 \Rightarrow 2+2-4 = 0$$

$$X_2^T X_3 \Rightarrow 4-2-2=0$$

$$X_1^T X_3 \Rightarrow 2-4+2=0$$
They are orthogonal to each other.

To form the Normalized Matrix:

$$N = \begin{bmatrix} y_3 & y_2 & 2y_3 \\ 2y_3 & y_3 & -2y_3 \\ 2y_3 & -2y_3 \end{bmatrix} \Rightarrow \frac{1}{3} \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 2 & 2 \\ 2 & 1 & -2 \\ 2 & -2 & 1 \end{bmatrix}$$
To find the transpare of normalized matrix

$$N^T = \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 2 & 2 \\ 2 & 1 & -2 \\ 2 & -2 & 1 \end{bmatrix} \frac{1}{3}$$
Calculate AN

$$AN = \frac{1}{3} \begin{bmatrix} 8 & -6 & 2 \\ -6 & 7 & -4 \\ 2 & -4 & 3 \end{bmatrix} \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 2 & 2 \\ 2 & 1 & -2 \\ 2 & -2 & 1 \end{bmatrix} = \begin{bmatrix} 0 & 2 & 10 \\ 0 & 1 & -10 \\ 0 & -2 & 5 \end{bmatrix}$$
Calculate Diagonized Matrix D

$$D = NAN^T$$

$$= 1 \begin{bmatrix} 8 & -6 & 2 \\ 3 & -6 & 7 & -4 \\ 2 & -4 & 3 \end{bmatrix} \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 2 & 2 \\ 2 & 1 & -2 \\ 2 & -2 & 1 \end{bmatrix} \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 2 & 2 \\ 2 & 1 & -2 \\ 2 & -2 & 1 \end{bmatrix} \cdot \frac{1}{3}$$

$$= \frac{1}{3} \begin{bmatrix} 1 & 2 & 2 \\ 2 & 1 & -2 \\ 2 & -2 & 1 \end{bmatrix} \begin{bmatrix} 0 & 2 & 10 \\ 0 & 1 & -10 \\ 0 & -2 & 5 \end{bmatrix}$$

$$= \begin{bmatrix} 0 & 0 & 0 \\ 0 & 3 & 0 \\ 0 & 0 & 15 \end{bmatrix}$$
