CROSS – CULTURE DIFFERENCES

PROJECTS TO PROMOTE CROSS CULTURE UNDERSTANDING

In the past, Europeans thought that their culture was better than any other. When they came in contact with other cultures, they tried to impose the European culture on them. That has changed. Canadians, working through the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA), make every effort to develop an understanding of other cultures when they interact with them. CIDA sponsors a number of projects to promote cross-cultural understanding.



CONTD

Training youth for work abroad:

CIDA finances an intern program to help young people work overseas. They receive training in cultural understanding and work in such areas as business development and education. They believe that the program not only makes them a more aware global citizen, but a better Canadian citizen as well.



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Launching immigrant and refugee artists:

Working with the Creativity and Innovation Company, CIDA is helping immigrant and refugee artists practise their craft and earn a living. Participants work one-on-one with an advisor to expand the audience for their work and build connections across the country. The program will also break down cultural barriers and build cultural understanding






